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A strong low pressure system over Colorado moved into Nebraska on the 7th of March then tracked east..northeast to southern Minnesota on the 8th. An abundant amount of moisture accompanied this storm system which brought rain and scattered thunderstorms across southern North Dakota before turning to wet snow. Snow amounts ranged between 3 to 6 inches with the heaviest falling over south central North Dakota. Winds during the storm ranged between 40 to 50 mph which created dangerous winter conditions. Major roads were closed in and around the Jamestown area in Stutsman county. In McIntosh county, residents in the city of Ashley were out of power for 30 hours during the height of the storm. Winds and ice downed numerous power lines.
